Reports from Committees and Organisations for 2019

Bellringers' Report

The bellringing team had a rather uneventful year during 2019. We welcomed the return of Peter Jackson who was a ringer many years ago but moved away and also a new recruit Rose Gornall. Both of them have relatives in the choir and during their Sunday contact at Broughton chose to join the ringing team too.

The group as a whole stays committed, and regular teams attend Sunday service ringing, weddings and other church events as required.

The handbell ringers again entertained during the Christmas period. Performances were given at the Hospital, The Harris Museum (video evidence is available on their Facebook page) and Waitrose as well as the annual Church Carol Service. Monies raised were donated to Rosemere Cancer research and Fox Street Mission.

1st Broughton Scout Group.

We are in the midst of finding new leaders for our busy sections. We are still maintaining good numbers in all Sections. We have 2 Beaver Colonies, 48 beavers in total, Monday and Wednesday. 3 cub packs Tuesday, Thursday and Friday with a total of 80 cubs. Following this, teas, coffee and cakes were served in the school hall and £114.75 was raised for church funds.

On Sunday 7th July, a Parish Picnic was held in the vicarage garden. We were blessed with good weather and those attending spent an enjoyable afternoon.

The Christmas Fair was held at St Peter's school in 2019 because of the closure of St Martin's complex. Preston Concert Band entertained us with their Christmas music. Despite fewer people attending, we made a profit of £1882.83. Our thanks go out to everyone who helped and supported us. We look forward to being able to resume social events as soon as building work and COVID19 allows. We will need to reform the socials committee, adding more volunteers to those who have worked so hard during the past, to raise money for Parish Funds.

Fulwood St Peter's Primary School and Nursery.

We have been looking at overall curriculum objectives for our children and changing the teaching and learning they experience. These are now as follows:

- Building confidence
- Making choices in learning
- Working independently
- Real life application of what is learnt
- Leading teams

Some of this was based on the findings of the national "Drawing the Future" survey of children's aspirations by the Education and Employers organisation. We asked parents of different occupations to come into school to talk about what they do. This varied from aircraft engineer and GP to beekeeper and shepherd.

Awards. We renewed our Green Flag Eco Schools mark (4th time), National Health School's status (2nd) and School Games Gold mark (2nd time).

We are in the final stages of acquiring a 50 year lease on some land next to school to use as a nature area. This will take time to develop and grow.

An article for Parliamentary Review was written on the significant impact that Teaching Assistants have on learning. Gareth Allen, our Deputy Head went to Parliament for the launch of the Review.

Broughton CE Primary School and Nursery

2019 was another successful and enjoyable year for Broughton CE Primary School where we continued to live by our Christian Values of love and joy. We were delighted to be in the top 3% of schools nationally for the progress which children make between key stage 1 and key stage 2 and to have further increased our standards of attainment at the end of key stage 2. Although academic performance is important to us, we are committed to providing our children with a wide range of high quality experiences. Last year, we were crowned Lancashire Sports Hall Athletics Champions for the third year in a row and both the girls' and boys' football teams played at Deepdale for the final of the Dick Kerr Cup and Harold Slater Cup which both teams won decisively. The choir got through to the regional final of the prestigious 'Last Choir Singing' competition and they won the 'Primary Choir' category at Blackburn Music Festival. Our Year 6 children performed their end of year play at Broughton Social Club, Rock Bottom, to huge critical acclaim and, as ever, our nativity plays which involve all children in school were one of the many highlights of the year.

Fairtrade

I have continued to try and obtain the best price for customers and the create a larger profit for the Church by sourcing Fairtrade items from Fairtrade Warehouse and Eden. Also, I have obtained chocolate at a discounted price at Booths as well as the usual outlet of Traidcraft.

There has been a reduction in the number Fairtrade stalls held in 2019 to mainly once a month. This was due to holding one Sunday service at either St Peter's or St. Martin's prior to the closure of the St. Martin's complex. This has also meant a decrease in the Fairtrade takings for 2019. Unfortunately, we have continued to suspend the monthly stall at St. John's due to previous lack of orders, if there is interest in 2020 at St John's then I will look at re-installing a monthly table.

Additional to the monthly stalls are orders for Easter Eggs and Christmas goods. For Easter 2019 we sold fifteen Fairtrade Easter Eggs with orders totalling £78. This was three more Easter Eggs sold and an increase of 19 pence.

Easter Eggs will be on sale again at the worship centres until the end of March, information will be noted onto the pew sheet.

There was a reduction in Christmas orders in 2019, with 20 items purchased totalling £85.02. This was 6 items and £39.27 less than the orders completed in Christmas 2018. The Traidcraft company did produce a separate Christmas Catalogue but this was only released in mid-November and was after our cut-off point for orders,

We also had a disappointing return from the Christmas Fair in 2019 with only £24.30 of orders sold, this was down by nearly two thirds from the Fair in 2018 and less than some Sunday services returns. The reduction was probably not helped as the stall was at the end of the corridor with no passing trade.

Fairtrade Fortnight will be back Monday 24 February - Sunday 8 March 2020. The focus in 2020 will be to ensure that all farmers are paid fairly for their work and are able to earn a living income, starting with cocoa farmers in West Africa.

Our aim in 2020 is again remaining to support and encourage the Fairtrade ethos within the Parish as I did in 2018 and 2019 at no cost to the Parish. Therefore, I will continue to provide Fairtrade Tea & Coffee to the St. Peter's service on a Sunday and the Friday service which has moved from St. Martin's to St. Margaret's. This has also included St. John's but I will need to know when these stocks are running low.

In my 2019 Fairtrade report it was noted that Traidcraft was suffering from financial difficulties and the company has relaunched and streamlined the business. Traidcraft has continued to stay in business and we have been able to purchase products from their catalogues.

Finally, a big thank you to the worship centre congregations who have purchased over £350 of Fairtrade items during 2019.
